42. ONCE UPON A TIME...

Overview: Students listen to stories of the past and learn about history of the southwest.

Objective: Students will learn a little history of the people and places of the southwest to better

understand our heritage.

Time needed: Approximately 30 minutes to an hour.

Group Size: any size

Age appropriateness: any grade

Site: Any location but, the Garden amphitheater is ideal.

Background: Prior knowledge of story-telling is helpful and will make this activity more successful. If the story-teller has the story or stories memorized and dresses the part or has a couple of props, it makes a better program. Two stories can be told in 30 to 45 minutes.

Materials:

Provided at the Garden

Provided by the classroom teacher A story or two

Preparation: The story-teller needs to learn the stories they plan to tell.

Pre Activity: Videos, posters, and class discussions of the past history of our area and its peoples.

Procedure: Have the students take a seat and close their eyes and imagine they are back in the time of your story. Tell the story and then discuss it with the students. The students should understand a little more about our past.

Modifications: Stories should be age appropriate.

Extensions: Students could create a piece of artwork, a diorama, poem, short story, or do research to learn more about the people in the story.
